## Grand Piano Dedication World Communion Sunday A Musical Extravaganza! October 6, 9:45 AM

Today we are dedicating a beautiful grand piano donated by the family of Rev. Robert and Marilyn Kaiser. Our Trustees had begun searching for a new piano to replace one that needed serious repair, but then stumbled across the Kaiser's Craig's List ad for a beautiful used grand piano. When the Kaiser's learned of our interest in the piano, they offered to donate it to us, as long as we covered the moving expense. Deal! Now the piano is in its new home in our sanctuary, and we are very grateful.

Bob is retired from the Gates Presbyterian Church, but has had a long post-retirement career in interim ministry and pulpit supply. He currently preaches at Stone Church one Sunday each month. As a new pastor starting out in 1983, Rev. Jim Renfrew considered Bob an excellent mentor.

Trained as a school teacher, in retirement Marilyn worked as a child care coordinator in an innovative parenting program at Jim's church in Rochester, "The Family Place", that helped many families suffering from neglect, abuse and violence find a new ways to care for their children by teaching parenting skills.

It is very fitting that this dedication takes place on World Communion Sunday when we participate in the Peacemaking Offering of the Presbyterian Church (USA). Bob and Marilyn have long been dedicated to the peaceful witness of the Presbyterian Church in the churches they have served, in the surrounding community, and most recently with support for justice and peace efforts in Latin America.

The Peacemaking Offering supports ministries and mission centered on peace within our presbytery and beyond. Twenty Five percent of the offering each year is left to the discretion of the local congregation to select a local cause. Session agreed that this year we will contribute our 25% local share to the Presbyterian Home's Memory Unit, where Marilyn Kaiser now lives in one of its residences in West Chili.


## Christian Education & Worship Committee

Our Session has designated the Memory Care Home, a part of the Presbyterian Home located in North Chili. This is a cause that is dear to the Kaisers and our way of honoring their gift to us. ## From the Pastor

Dear Friends,

What is the most courageous thing that you have ever done?

When I was about ten years old my friends urged me to jump off the high dive at the local pool. I climbed the tall ladder and stood at the end of the board for many long minutes as my friends egged me on. In the end, I went back down the ladder. I've never went back!

I'm not alone. One day a gang of squirrels raced across the lawn, ran up to the top of the tree and then, in turn, each one sprinted out onto a thin wobbly branch to take a flying leap over to the next tree, landing on another thin wobbly branch scabbling like crazy to hang on for dear life. Every squirrel made that death-defying leap, except the last one. That one put on the brakes, took a long look, decided it was too big of a leap, and it went back down the tree trunk to the ground. If I was a squirrel I guess that would have been me!

Don't get me wrong, I have done some courageous things in my life and so have you. Some times we act courageously after a lot of thought and planning. A musical performance can involve learning to tame nervousness, but other times our courage is more impulsive, like the time I ran across the street to confront an adult neighbor who was kicking a little boy's dog. I didn't even like dogs - as a paperboy they regularly tried to kill me - but what I saw was wrong and I took action. When I got back into my house my heart was pounding so hard I thought I might break some ribs. A courageous action can affect the world around us, but it especially affects our own sense of self - when we do something we never thought we could ever do, and yet we did it!!

So when have you done something courageous? Now I hope you are especially thinking about courageous acts of faith, maybe not as dramatic as the high dive or confronting an angry neighbor, but the kind of choices you have made to go out on a limb against all logic and reason to serve God, help others, and to live more authentically.

A little girl named Allyson brought a dime to church one Sunday morning. It was the only money she had. She had heard the adults worry about a serious leak in the church roof, so the next Sunday she brought that dime to give. She knew nothing about the thousands of dollars that were needed. She put her dime in the plate. Allyson made courage look easy! I hope we can all help each other become more courageous, too!

## Mission Committee

**Backpack Program:** Food items were delivered to 5 families over the summer months. This really gives a chance for interaction and getting to know the families we serve. Three stories came out of the deliveries this summer worth sharing.

ONE: A story of a single mom with a special needs student with learning disabilities has purchased her first home through the first time home buyers program. She did a lot of research before deciding if this would work for her, and it will mean switching districts, which was of concern for her son. She was able to confirm the district she is moving to will offer good services to her son. She is hoping that the backpack program will still work for him in the new district, as it has been such a great help to her to help stretch her budget.

TWO: A family with three children. The Dad had an episode of bad health 2 years ago and fought a bout of cancer. Successful so far, but the situation left them burdened with leftover medical bills which they are still working to pay off. She mentioned how much the food has helped them to stretch their budget as things are very tight. She said each month they have to decide what bills they are able to pay and how much they can put towards the medical debt they have. Also of interest—her son would not touch vegetables until he was bringing home his backpack each week and he now will eat—and loves—the vegetables!!!

THREE: A family threatened by the legalities behind being "illegal". Children all born in the US, but mom is currently under threat of being deported. She was asked by ICE to inform on other families in the area and they would be able to offer her the chance to stay here. She does not want to put other families at risk. She does not want her son to go back to Mexico if she is deported—WHY? Because he is tall, and broad, and she is afraid he will end up dead due to drug cartels. They look to forcibly recruit teens of his build, and either through the actions they are forced into or by refusing to be recruited, they end up dead.

This food program is a consistent, helpful program—and we literally may not realize the impact such a program is having on families in our own community. And we really probably never realize what situations these families are finding themselves in. Thank you to each and every one of you that has helped to support this initiative over the many years we have been doing this. Donations to the program can always be made by marking your donation **BACKPACK PROGRAM** and dropping it in the collection plate or sending it to church.

## October 22 Bible Study

I've been watching the eight-part Country Music series by Ken Burns on PBS this past week. In one scene, a woman being interviewed described her reaction to hearing for the first time Patsy Cline's song, "I Fall to Pieces". It's a song about a relationship ending badly, and when the woman heard it while driving her car she immediately connected it to her own failing relationship. She said, on camera, "It was like Patsy knew all about me when she sang that song, and I didn't feel so alone anymore".

I was struck by that comment and related it to reading the Bible. Often we are slogging through long paragraphs filled with names of people and places that we can barely pronounce, much less understand, when all of a sudden one particular verse seizes my heart and soul, and I wonder in amazement how God seemed to know everything about me and everything about what I really need.

I have found some of these gems from time to time while reading the Bible, and I am always hoping to find more of them. It's why I keep coming back for more. My gem may be a complete "dud" for you, but something I've skipped over as a "dud" might be the gem you have found. It's what I love about reading the Bible together - we can share those "aha!" moments with each other, those moments when we are amazed to discover that God has just touched us like never before.

Jim Moore has asked me to prepare our next Bible Study, on Tuesday, October 22, 7:00 PM. The text will be Matthew 13:45: "***the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant looking for fine pearls; when he finds one of great value he goes and sells everything he owns and buys it.***"

Is this verse the gem that you have missed? Let's find out!

### Bible Study Prep:

Tell us about a gem you have found in the Bible, one of those texts in which God seemed to know everything about you.

Let's make a list of questions we might ask the merchant, to learn from him what made this gem and his desire to have it so compelling.

What do you think Jesus means by the phrase "kingdom of heaven". How is a pearl like the kingdom of heaven?

What things have been placed in front of you that might serve as your window into the heart of God?

Yet all of us come to this time having been accompanied by a loving and caring Jesus who continues to invite us into deeper relationship - with ourselves, with each other, and with our God. All of our faith is meant to be relational, and authentic relationships are best built through sharing stories, life-experiences, hopes and dreams. That is never truer than in a faith community. In fact, our entire Christian way of being is about sharing the Story of Jesus - how his story has impacted our own life story, and how all of our stories together get lived out in community as we share the Good News of God's life-changing love. His story changes the world - one relationship at a time.

South Presbyterian Church is bringing The Rev. Dr. Ray Jones, Director of Theology, Formation & Evangelism for the PC(USA), back to Rochester at the beginning of November and we are inviting our brothers and sisters in the Vital Congregations Initiative to join us for the morning workshop. Several members of South have worked with Ray over the last eight years. He is a master at helping us to find ways of having those conversations - with God, with others, with ourselves - about our faith and our communities. He helps us tell our individual and our collective stories. As Ray says, "You can't share the Good News unless it's actually first good news to you."

We hope that you will join us on **Saturday, November 2nd, from 9:00 AM until 12 Noon** (registration and refreshments begin at 8:30) at Gates Presbyterian Church as we learn how to: Know our Faith, Grow our Faith, and Show our Faith.

## Fall Stewardship Plans
